Time: 50 min

The language context: English as foreign language

Language points: making request in restaurant (May I have...../ Can I have..../could you tell me the taste of...../May I help you)

Materials: PowerPoint (pictures, grammar rule, and examples), video, and handout

SWBAT:

By the end of the class, students will be able to use modal verbs (can, may, would by creating dialogue and acting it out in a role playing.

What has been covered in the prior class?

Students learned how to use modal verbs to make statements.

 What lessons were the learners taught prior in my class? Learners use different adjectives to describe food and drinks. They learned different adjective of taste and appearance of food and drinks, and different food and drinks' name.

May	<u>May I</u> have the sales report?	 Asking for permission
Would	<u>Would you</u> mind I sit next to you? <u>I would like</u> to have some French Fries. <u>Would you like</u> some cheese cake today?	 Asking for permission Request Preference
